Doctors Without Borders/MSF

April 29 "Let's Talk Covid". There is a great divide of equity in providing vaccines world-wide. Just 0.3% of available vaccine is sent to low-income countries. This inequity prolongs the pandemic. Here's what we can do: contact your representative in congress and demand that the US government, the largest funder of vaccine production, force manufacturers to share their technology with other capable companies around the world. Also, individually, you can go into peoplevaccine.org to get involved. Have we learned from this situation to keep it from happening again? The DWB panel is optimistic that we have.

May 4. "Reflections on a Decade of War in Syria", Syria is not all one country. Assad controls the south, the Kurds the northeast and rebel forces and Turkey the northwest. Medical support workers are constantly on the move. When they reach relative safety, they set up emergency facilities. These are often bombed because it is believed they harbor insurgents.

Syrian people are now trapped as borders to neighboring countries close due to overcrowding, food insecurities, Covid19 and drought. The flow of aid through the Syrian government does not reach those that the UN intends and those who need it. The Syrian government is not willing to negotiate with DWB health teams. Over the past decade, 40% of the medical staff was lost. They either died or disappeared. Nevertheless, DWB will carry on with the work there with the support of the International community.

LifeMoves

May 11 "Corporate Leadership". LifeMove's aim is to eradicate homelessness, and their formula is working. Over the past 5-6 years, 14,000 people have found permanent housing, and 96% of those have stayed. The pandemic has emphasized homelessness. There is a need for corporations to get involved with funding and volunteers. Businesses can solve problems around the world. They need to solve issues in their own backyard. Cisco Corp. has pledged \$50 million over the next 5 years. Land is also needed for setting up modular shelters. Getting more corporations involved can be a game changer in solving homelessness.

New York New York

For my first trip, as a Pan Am Stewardess, after proudly receiving my wings in July 1958, I flew a DC-6 from Idlewild to Paris. When I got there, I noticed - an American newspaper headline, "Marines Land in Beirut". This caught my attention, but didn't really concern me at the time - *UNTIL* - I was supposed to return home after my layover in Paris, but because of the problem in Beirut, Pan Am had agreed to assist with the removal of American women and children from Lebanon, so I got off-schedule and was rerouted to Beirut. When we landed there, it was frightening to see American soldiers encircling our aircraft, machine guns at the ready - for our protection - something I had never seen before - it was my first flight after all - but a sight I would see often in Vietnam a few years later.

The women and children were boarded as quickly as possible, filling every seat, and then some. As soon as we were fully loaded, we flew back to safety in Paris. We repeated this same rescue mission several times over the next few days, and on the last day, some of my crew were sent home. I was told I had a day in Paris, and then would be on call after that, so I took the train to see the Brussels World Fair, it was an exciting day. During the next few days I think I walked every wonderful street in Paris and couldn't believe how lucky I was to be doing so.

On the fifth day, I called Paris Ops to see when I was scheduled to fly home, but both they and NY Scheduling didn't know who I was!!!! Now I wonder how much longer I would have been there before they realized their mistake! They finally figured out that I was, indeed, a stewardess, and I ferried back to NY on the wonderful B-377 Stratocruiser, with only the cockpit crew as my passengers. I had the unique experience of sleeping in one of the pull-down berths that we've all seen photos of, but few have experienced.

On a flight from Lisbon to Accra, I was flying Purser, with two Stewardesses onboard. It was a night flight, so the passengers were all asleep, when I noticed the Engine 1 propeller had stopped. I went forward to report, but of course, they were aware, and not at all bothered because there were three more. Then another prop stopped, on the other side of the aircraft, so at least we were balanced. The cockpit seemed confident, and I hoped they weren't just acting that was so as not to scare me, but I had the stews go over all the emergency procedures just in case. THEN, we were almost in descent when the THIRD engine went dead! Somehow we landed safely on one engine, and the passengers, blissfully unaware of the drama, disembarked in Accra, none the wiser. I remember that one of the stews was very scared though.

San Francisco Here I Come

I transferred to SFO in 1962 for what was going to be just two years to see the beauties of San Francisco, Hawaii, Asia and Australia before returning home to New Jersey, but here I am, still here in California!!

The Vietnam R&R flights had a big impact on me. The GI's were always so happy when leaving for their fun-filled 5 days of R&R and so quiet and sullen when returning to an unknown future. I often think of them and wonder how many of them never made it home

Celebrities I Met

I had many celebrities onboard, but a few really stood out. Marlon Brando was flying in First Class on a 707 and let it be known he didn't want anything to eat or drink or to be disturbed. During the flight, he caught my eye, and I smiled at him, and he said, loudly "The whitest teeth in the Western Hemisphere!" I was floating on air for the rest of the flight!

I had Steve McQueen in FC on a 707 from LHR to LAX. After the meal service, he was in the circular lounge up front and told me he had just been in a movie called "The Cincinnati Kid", which was about a card player, and he didn't know how to play cards. So I sat with him for my whole rest time and taught him to pay Gin Rummy. (In retrospect, he may have been putting me on and knew how to play). I never asked celebrities for autographs, but he said to me "I'm going to give you an autograph that you will not show to your husband". Then he wrote: "To Marilyn, Thanks for our many hours of passion! Steve McQueen". Of course, Joe loved it and we had many laughs about it.

Another one that stands out is when I had Elizabeth Taylor and her then-husband, Eddie Fisher, aboard in FC, and she had a very bad cold. Her violet eyes were incredibly beautiful. She had on a lavender outfit, and so her eyes were almost hypnotizing, they were so beautiful -- and that is even when she was so very sick. She and he couldn't have been nicer to the whole crew throughout the flight. I read in the papers that she was so ill that she had to have a tracheotomy in her hotel in London and was in the hospital for a while.

The highlight of my career, of course, is when I met my husband, Joe, when he was my passenger from SFO-TYO in 1965.
